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
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

Festa major

A **festa major** (*FES-ta ma-DJOH*) is a district or town's most important festival. It can honour a patron saint and may last days or even weeks, with live music, parades, traditional events, food and more.

What am I doing here?

The last local left in August

If you're visiting Barcelona in August, you may notice a few things: it's really hot, lots of shops are closed, and the city is more international than you thought it'd be. The reason for these is one and the same – because it is the hottest time of the year, the locals tend to head out of the country, or at least out of the sweltering city.

That leaves you, the visitor, and me, the only fool in town who took her holidays in June and now has to sweat it out the rest of the summer while colleagues flee the office like kids on the last day of school, magazine pages thrown into the air with a good-riddance as they jet off to the Phillippines and Sri Lanka, Italy and India. Trying to make me jealous with their vaccinepunctured arms and purchases of ultra-light luggage as I sit here with an air-conditioning system made of a USB-powered desk fan and some rapidly disappearing ice cubes.

So what's good about staying here in August? There's a more languid pace, far less traffic, and fewer crowds outside the city centre. There's the sticky but fun Gràcia festival in mid-August. Public pools are open. Long evening meals on terraces. Watermelon!

So let my coworkers come back at the end of the month with bronzed skin, relaxed demeanors and photos of faraway lands. I can walk to work without hitting a single red light. And if it's too hot for that, I can try all the ice creams in this month's Top Ten, leaving the melted run-off on someone else's desk.

Jan is still getting over a nasty holiday sunburn.

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14:00-16:30

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Start at the Born Centre Cultural (Pl. Comercial, 12), an iron and glass structure built in 1876 as a market. From there you can stop in at the spectacular Santa Maria del Marchurch (Pl. de Santa Maria, 1), a local favourite and setting for many a wedding. Just next to that is the Fossar de les Moreres, a square that might not be much to look at, but which has great significance to the people of Barcelona; it was built over a cemetery where those who died fighting to defend the city in the 1714 Siege of Barcelona were buried. The square features an eternal flame to honour the memory of the fallen.

17:00-19:30 Sustenance and shopping

Stop for a break in one of the Born's lesser-known squares, such as

Sant Pere de les Puel-les or Sant Agusti Vell. The Born is an area that's packed with boutiques where you can pick up some designer shoes or one-of-a-kind gifts to bring home. As you're strolling through the streets, keep your eye out for Ivori (Mirallers, 7), an exquisite shop with local designs, On Land (Princesa, 25), where both men and women can find new threads, and Studiostore (Comerç, 17), with everything from clothes and eyewear to original cushions.

20:00-23:30 It's time to eat

For dinner, try the Asian tapas at Mosquito (Carders, 46) – they'll melt in your mouth. Always a sure thing is a meal in one of the city's fresh markets, such as Santa Caterina (Av. Francesc Cambo, 16) with its attention-drawing rooftop, or try Mercat Princesa (Flassaders, 21), where you don't have to limit your choice to just one restaurant

COOL HUNTING

Once called the 'Barrio Chino', the Raval has inspired many a writer. Nowadays, it's a place where local businesses thrive in the form of unique shops and restaurants, while still maintaining some of its seedy underworld glamour. Urban culture is booming here, alongside gems such as the CCCB and Filmoteca.

but can graze from 16 different food 'stalls'. To top off the night, head in the direction of the sea and have a drink in Absenta (Sant Carles, 36) and you're sure to get a good night's sleep, the more upscale Zahara Cocktail Club (Pg. Joan de Borbó, 69) or Café de los Angelitos (Almirall Cervera, 26).

09:00-11:30 Trees and parks

Start your day with a big breakfast among the tree-lined streets of the Eixample Esquerre. Velodromo (Muntaner, 213) opens at 6am, for those of you really keen to get going, while Travel & Cake (Rosselló, 189) opens every day from 9am and has an eclectic menu of sweet and savoury options. Once you've got your energy levels up, jump on public transport and head up to Gaudí's natural wonder, Park Güell – book in advance on www.parkguell.cat to ensure you get in to the 'monumental' zone and save a euro. Bonus!

12:00-14:00 Gracious living

Grab a bite down the hill in Gràcia, at the woodsy and spacious Café Salambó

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city views.

(Torrijos, 51) or at La Pubilla (PI. de la Llibertat, 23), specialising in old-school local food or, if the weather's nice, in a square such as Placa del Diamant or Placa de la Vila de Gràcia. While you're in the area, have a look around for some unusual souvenirs in the shop-lined streets - suggestions include Pinc Store for clothes (Encarnació, 24) and Magnesia (Torrent de l'Olla, 192) or Mueblé (Martínez de la Rosa, 34) for homewares.

14:30-18:00 **Explore modernisme**

Next stop: the Sagrada Família. Gaudí's masterpiece gets very crowded, but take your time to appreciate his vision. Once done, walk over to Av. Diagonal to keep the modernisme theme going by stopping at Casa de les Punxes (Rosselló, 260), Palau del Baró de Quadras (Diagonal, 373) and Casa Planells

(Diagonal, 332). Alternatively, take the metro from the Sagrada Família (L5) to Diagonal and stroll down Passeig de Gràcia to just hit the modernisme biggies: La Pedrera (Provença, 261), Casa Amatller (Pg. de Gràcia, 41) and Casa Batlló (Pg. de Gràcia, 43).

WANDER OFF

Many visitors stick to the central areas, but the city is so much more. Gràcia is full of life at all hours of the day, Sarrià retains much of its historical small-town feel, while Poble-sec and Sant Antoni are currently the places to be, thanks to their top cuisine and quality nightlife. And not forgetting the hilltop theme park of Tibidabo.

19:30-02:00 **Big night out**

Try the out-of-this-world double terrace of Invisible-Pizza Ravalo (PI. Emili Vendrell, 1), Teresa Carles for a healthy vegetarian option (Jovellanos, 2), or the Mediterranean banquet that is Lo de Flor (Carretes, 18). After lining your stomach, get a couple of drinks in Negroni or Tahiti, both in the barladen street of Joaquín Costa (46 and 39, respectively), and then ease on down to the dance floors at Apolo, Marula or other area clubs, before calling it a night.

10:00-12:00 **Mountain climbing**

Head to the 'mountain' of Montjuïc. Depending on what you're in the mood for, you can visit the Museu Nacional d'Art de Catalunya (MNAC), the Olympic Stadium and other nearby constructions from the 1992 Games, or walk around the

plentiful gardens, such as the Jardins Laribal (Pg. Santa Madrona, 2). A short walk away, just past Plaça Espanya, you'll find the Parc Joan Miró, with its dramatic 'Woman and Bird' sculpture.

13:00-15:00 End on a beach spot

Take the cable car from Montjuïc to Barceloneta, with its beaches and boats, where you can relax with a vermouth and a paella. Most restaurants in Barceloneta specialise in seafood, taking advantage of the nearby Med. The prime real estate means some of the better spots aren't cheap, but if you're feeling flush, they're worth it. Try Can Solé (Sant Carles, 4), La Mar Salada (Pg. Joan de Borbó, 58) or El Suquet de l'Almirall (Pg. Joan de Borbó, 65). A great place for the more budget-conscious, with a huge terrace and fresh, scrummy dishes to go with their relaxed vibe is Santa Marta (Grau i Torras, 59).

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

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TORRE DE LES AIGÜES

In 1870, the Torre de les Aigües provided water to some of the first houses to be built in the Eixample district. Now, more than a century later, converted into a swimming pool and a small park (that somewhat lacks in grass), it provides fun for young and old alike. As temperatures soar in August, the Torre de les Aigües is a welcoming oasis – it's known locally as the 'beach of the Eixample': relief from the heat, and unlimited opportunities for splashing, paddling and generally getting wet.

PARC DE LA CIUTADELLA

There's so much going on in this surprisingly extensive park – including the zoo, a children's park and a boating lake – that it's sometimes hard to find a plain, old-fashioned patch of grass. At this time of year, the Ciutadella (the largest park in the city centre) is a great place for a picnic, a bike ride or taking a break from sightseeing with an ice cream. If your kids need a bit of space to run around, this is one of the best spots in Barcelona to take them. **Passeig de Picasso, 21. Free**

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Housed in a fabulous modernista building in the foothills of Montjuïc, once you've crossed the desert-like expanse between Plaça Espanya and the entrance to the museum, blessed relief and varied culture await. While older children may enjoy the current exhibition on Finnish architect Alvar Aalto, there is also a series of children's cinema screenings that will appeal to

× CAFÉS...

After a busy few hours of doing stuff, a sitdown for some sustenance is more than welcome. At Granja La Nena in Gràcia, not only do they have a selection of delicious snacks and drinks, there's also a play corner and range of board games (Ramón y Cajal, 36). Alternatively, treat your kids (and yourself!) to a gourmet doughnut at La Donuteria. From Nutella-stuffed (the Donutella) to pink grapefruit and ginger flavour, this is sugar heaven (Parlament, 20). Another option is Babelia, a combined café/second-hand bookshop, which has a library of kids' books in English to flick through and a fortnightly Saturday story time (Villarroel, 27; closed Aug 15-31).

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POBLE ESPANYOL

A little way up the road from CaixaForum (on hot days, it's probably best to take the bus there from Plaça Espanya) is this tribute to architectural styles from around Spain, with reproductions of buildings from Andalusia to Zaragoza (more or less). It might not sound the most enticing place for kids, but they also run a host of family-focused activities. For example, every Sunday this month, they are hosting games mornings that include sack races, giant jigsaws and hula hoop contests (10.30am-1.30pm; included in general entry fee). They also have a picnic area and a treasure hunt that gives families the chance to discover the venue's nooks and crannies (Mon-Sun 10am-6pm; in Spanish, Catalan, English and French; €5.70; up to five participants).

MIBA. MUSEU D'IDEES I INVENTS DE Barcelona

A celebration of what we're capable of creating when we put our minds to it, this city centre museum was originally designed for adults, but it has endless appeal for children, too - a periscope in the shop, bathrooms full of surprises, and a range of inventions to discover and stimulate their own creativity. For instance, in the Corner of the Absurd, the exhibits were designed for nothing more or less than to bring a smile to the lips - and why not? The Minimiba gives 5- to 12-year-olds the chance to come up with and draw their own invention. EATING OUT...

While most restaurants in BCN welcome children, there are some specially geared up to them. Idò DO Balear, dedicated to food from the Balearics, has an area with a big blackboard where the kids can play while you eat (Viladomat, 43; closed Aug 3-24). At Restaurant Marc, in Vila Olímpica, there's a space that has adult supervision for the children at weekends, and they regularly organise different activities (Joan Miró, 24; closed Aug 7-19). If you're heading to Collserola Park, two minutes from the train station is Bar Restaurant Pinya 2. The grilled meats are excellent, and there's a great terrace for kids to play on (Ctra. de l'Església; T. 93 280 26 49).

GOLONDRINAS

Indulge your little pirates aboard one of the emblematic wooden boats that have been sailing round the port since 1888, the year of Barcelona's Universal Exposition. There's the classic 40-minute tour of the industrial port, or a longer excursion in a catamaran that heads up the coast past Barceloneta and the Vila Olímpica. Both give you the chance to take in the city skyline and appreciate the sights from a different perspective. Weigh anchor, all hands! Prepare to make sail!

MUSEU BLAU

Barcelona's Natural Sciences Museum (or Blue Museum) covers 9,000 square metres, and at the main entrance has the skeleton of a whale that beached itself on Catalan shores in 1862. As well as permanent installations and spaces that include 'Planet Life', an exhibition on the history of life and planet Earth, at the moment there's an interactive temporary exhibit about healthy eating and nutrition, which might even encourage carrot consumption among some. For children six and under, the Niu de Ciencia (Science Nest) is a dedicated space where they can play and start discovering the world of science.

MUSEU EGIPCI

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One of the finest collections of Ancient Egyptian artefacts in Europe, this one is owned by prominent Egyptologist Jordi Clos and spans 3,000 years of Nile-drenched culture. Children (and adults as well) will be fascinated by exhibits such as the massive baboon heads used to decorate temples, and mummified cats, baby crocodiles and falcons. Another highlight is a 5,000-year-old bed, which still looks comfortable enough to sleep in. Currently on show is an exhibition about the discovery of the Tutankhamun tomb back in the '20s. ĽAQUARI

Home to more than 11,000 animals representing 450 species (normal in what is the world's largest Med-themed marine attraction), the main draw at Barcelona's aquarium is the Oceanari, a giant sharkinfested tank traversed via a glass tunnel on a slow-moving conveyor belt. Other aquaria house shoals of kaleidoscopic fish where kids can play 'hunt Nemo'. The upstairs section is devoted to children. For pre-schoolers, Explora! has 50 knobs-and-whistles-style activities, such as turning a crank to see how ducks' feet move underwater or climbing inside a mini submarine; they probably won't mind that much

SHOPPING...

Younger kids will be delighted by a trip to Barruguet, a stylish toy shop that stocks an excellent selection of games and activities to inspire their creativity (Gran Via de les Corts Catalanes, 620). If you're on the hunt for a souvenir for the child of your most hipster friends back home, stop by Impossible Project and you'll be overwhelmed by choices - wooden games, original books and modern fashion (Tantarantana, 16). And if it's clothes you're in the market for, then head to Go Kids. They have a big assortment of brands and products from cute clothes for babies right up to smart gear for ten-yearolds (Elisabets, 20; closed Aug 10-15).


MUSEU DE LA XOCOLATA

Seriously, who doesn't like chocolate? Dark, milk or even the not-actually-officially-chocolate white version - everyone has a fave. And this is the place to go if you're feeling particularly indulgent with your offspring. Telling the story of chocolate, from its origins in South America to its unstoppable journey across the globe, the history part of this museum may not keep kids captivated. But the numerous and varied chocolate sculptures made by some of Barcelona's master pastry chefs will doubtless thrill them, even though you may to have keep an eye out for reaching hands. PARC NATURAL COLLSEROLA

If you're looking for a rest from the city, take to the hills behind Barcelona, aka Collserola Natural Park. If your children are 12 or older, on August 12 the information centre is hosting a special evening event to witness the Perseids, a summer meteor shower also known as the 'tears of Saint Lawrence', as the phenomenon appears around his feast day on August 10 (call

In this enormous science museum - said to be the biggest in Europe - it can take a while to actually find the exhibits, with sweeping walkways and a slightly confusing lift layout. It's worth the trek though, thanks to features such as the Flooded Forest (a reproduction of a corner of Amazonia with various harmless creatures roaming about) and excellent installations for children: the Planetarium pleases those aged five to eight, and the wonderful Clik (ages 3-6) and Flash (ages 7-9) introduce children to science through games. Toca, Toca! ('Touch, Touch!') educates children on which animals and plants are safe and which to avoid. Another highlight, for both young and old, is the hugely entertaining sound telescope outside on Plaça de la Ciència.

BEACHES

If in doubt, where better to head than the beach? Kids love the sand and the sea, and there's certainly a lot of both to enjoy in Barcelona. On Nova Icària and Mar Bella beaches, you'll find playgrounds for added entertainment. And if you came without buckets and spades, head to the Centre de la Platja, where you can hire all sorts of essential equipment for the day (Pg. Marítim, 25).

OUT OF TOWN...

If you'd like to explore more of Catalonia, there's any number of places that your children will be happy to go. Top of the list for most of them will be PortAventura, Catalonia's answer to Disneyland, with six themed zones and fantastic rides for the courageous (www.portaventura.cat). Up in the Pyrenees, the Segre Olympic Park makes for an ideal day trip for adventureloving families. White-water rafting, mountain biking and hydro sledging are just a sample of what's on offer (www. parcolimpic.cat). Finally, if nature is more your thing, head to the south of Catalonia and the **Delta de l'Ebre** for bird spotting and boat trips (www.terresdelebre.travel).



As high temperatures set in, the body cries out for refreshing, healthy food. It's time for light dishes and seasonal produce. These are the restaurants with the freshest, most original summer menus.

01 TRADITIONS AND LOCAL PRODUCE: ECO-FRIENDLY SEASONAL COOKING

If the economic crisis has had one positive effect, it's the rediscovery of humble ingredients. Or perhaps rather than a rediscovery, it would be more accurate to talk about defending simple products. At Gat Blau (Diputació, 139) Pere Carrió sets out from a 'radically ecological perspective, based on seasonal, ultra-local produce', and the results are amazing: 'A whole organic jowl of bacon costs €4. A kilo of organic chickpeas, €3. A prime entrecôte is expensive, but you can make a tartare from the humbler cuts.' And they do it incredibly well. They perform the ordinary miracle of serving a €11.50 set lunch menu that's organic, traditional and creative, on which six of the eight options are vegetarian. And it changes daily! You won't miss pricey ingredients like Palamós prawns when faced by delicacies as good as silky-smooth veal cannelloni wrapped in courgettes, or a 'masked' potato coulant. In the evening, you'll find locavore haute cuisine for around €25.

Obviously, learning to appreciate fresh ingredients from an early age is a huge advantage, and can define your eating habits for life. Joan Vilalta, the friendly face of **Gut** (Perill, 13; T. 93 186 63 60), was lucky enough 'to have a stay-at-home mum who went to the market every day, and was an education for the taste buds'. His own culinary vision has two strands. He's obsessed with ensuring that everything he serves up was brought in fresh from the market as recently as possible; and



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he has a mission to introduce vegetarian food to recalcitrant carnivores – although Gut is omnivorous and non-extremist. 'I serve the dish and tell them, "If you don't like it, I'll bring you something else."' Who could turn down wild rice with shiitake mushrooms and artichoke crisps? People who eat red meat three times a day, perhaps. On his summer menu, fish takes a higher billing than meat: tuna tartare with avocado, nori seaweed and sweet lemon sorbet – just thinking about it can cool you down. As an added bonus, more than half the items on the menu are gluten-free.

We began by talking about radical ecology. The next step is biodynamics, organic farming that follows the cycles of nature and the moon. We won't go into the more obscure practices – such as stuffing a cow's horn with manure and burying it in the ground – but it's worth pointing out that at **NONONO** (Ptge. de Lluís Pellicer, 12; T. 93 444 99 01) they didn't opt for a

ESQUEIXADA

Catalans like to think of themselves as eating a healthy Mediterrnean diet, but you often get the feeling a Catalan meal isn't complete without red meat as the centrepiece. To counter this impression, we recommend the Catalan salad par excellence: esqueixada de bacallà, salt cod salad in which cold, de-salted cod shares the stage with onion, peppers and olives in cool, soothing harmony. **EL JARDÍ DE L'ÀPAT**

Albert Llanas, 2 93 285 77 50 biodynamic approach just to make the food taste nicer, but because they 'want to leave a better world for those who come after us', says the owner, Marcos Acosta. Most of their vegetable produce comes from their own farm just up the coast from Barcelona.

02 FLEXITARIANS, DESIGNER FOOD AND RAW POWER: GREEN IS THE NEW BLACK

In the old days, Barcelona's vegetarian restaurants had a cultish feel - you almost felt obliged to put on a hemp kaftan as you chewed solemnly through mounds of raw vegetables. The trend now - and it's a positive one - is to develop a distinctive style, always aiming to reach the widest possible clientele. And what people want are fresh ingredients and seasonal cooking, whether they're vegans, ovo-lacto-vegetarians or (brace yourselves) flexitarians. This last, according to Cécile from the restaurant D'Aquí (Venus, 3; T. 93 458 20 44), is the latest term for people who occasionally eat meat or fish (or for vegetarian restaurants that, like them, offer a non-vegetarian option on the menu). 'If they only eat meat every couple of weeks, they want it to be the best quality.' They don't use processed ingredients, all the dishes are home-made, and the majority of the produce is organic, from smallholdings up the coast in the Maresme. Tuck in your napkin for the €13 set lunch menu, which features delicious recipes and a non-vegetarian option - such as their organic beef lasagne. It's an innovative formula, and they've only been open for a few months: from 9am to 5pm it's D'Aquí, while at night it becomes French bistro Atmosphère.

On the subject of easy-going radicalism, **Sopa** (Roc Boronat, 114; T. 93 309 56 76) is a strictly vegan restaurant, but they prefer to call it simply 'healthy food'. The extraordinary interior design – light, wood, glass and plenty of space – can be misleading; you feel you should be ordering top-end seafood and a bottle of cold white wine. They offer a daily set menu that always includes a soup or purée that has been cooked over a low heat for

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three hours, and second courses that are strictly seasonal.


They built up a loyal clientele in just a matter of months - just like the take-away food store, which also has plenty of room to sit down and eat your lunch in situ. Les Tres a la Cuina (Sant Lluís, 35; T. 93 105 49 47). Locals from all over the Gràcia district flock here to take home boxed-up portions of their trademark dishes, legendary for their freshness and creativity. They offer a different set menu every day, with three first courses and three seconds, predominantly vegetarian, but always including one option with animal protein. For example, endives with caramelised walnuts and blue cheese, followed by beef ragout with fried rice or a quinoa salad with smoked aubergine, mango and radishes.

03 CEVICHES AND PISCO SOURS: PERUVIAN REFRESHMENT

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After dining at a Peruvian restaurant, whether traditional or ultramodern, you never get the feeling you're too full, or that your digestive system is working overtime. It could be an unassuming spot like Toya Petit Bar (Viladomat, 249: T. 626 71 12 94: pictured right), just a bar with two tables, where David Villanueva runs his one-man show. 'This is a small place, but just because it's a bar doesn't mean we don't have gastronomic ambitions.' Good things come in small packages - and the fish is always fresh, an article of faith for Peruvian cooks. On the set lunch menu, there's a tomato and pesto carpaccio, and, for seconds, griddled langoustines (€10.50). At night it becomes a small tasting menu (€14) with the addition of their own version of the Peruvian classic papas a la huancaína (potatoes in a creamy sauce), a hamburger tasting with three sauces (huancaína, blackolive mayonnaise and creamed avocado) and a burrito with anticucho sauce.

When I interrogate Álex Luna of the wonderful **Ceviche 103** (Londres, 103; T. 93 209 88 35) about the essential freshness of Peruvian cuisine, he tells me, 'In Peruvian



TABBOULEH

Is there a more emblematically Mediterranean dish than tabbouleh? The foundation of this refreshing salad is bulgur, not a type of cereal, but the parboiled, hulled kernels of several different species of wheat – especially durum. cooking everything is made just before it's served. And we could use perch or any other fish, but to make a real ceviche you need wild corvina.' From the set lunch menu I pick a phenomenal ceviche that, served with *leche de tigre* (a citrusy seafood marinade) and washed down with a pisco sour, would quench Clint Eastwood's thirst at the end of *A Fistful of Dollars*. The second course is duck with a mildly spicy sauce, just hot enough to be interesting without bringing you out in a sweat. And profiteroles filled with passion fruit! A set lunch menu for only €14.50, it sends you strolling back to work, refreshed and satisfied.

However, Peruvians don't have a monopoly on freshness: **Tonka** (Marquès de Campo Sagrado, 27; T. 93 127 05 44), run by Venezuelan owner Mayela Armas, is a local institution, with a reputation based on local, organic produce – they have the best zerogrease brunch in Barcelona – and dishes like their Asian salad are summertime on a plate.



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ARCHITECTURAL ESCALATION

It's ironic that *Mon Oncle*, by Jacques Tati, an implacable critic of the excesses of contemporary architecture, is many modern architects' favourite film. We don't know if the architect behind the Filmoteca de Catalunya is one of its fans, but we can't rule out the possibility that the film inspired the decision to provide magnificent escalators to sweep audiences to the downstairs projection rooms – while to get out again, they have to tackle the 42 unyielding steps of a steep and dingy staircase. Or wait to squeeze into the lift, which holds 13, for a Filmoteca that seats 555.

METEOROLOGICAL MISHAPS

The escalators at the Filmoteca are fitted with mirrors: according to the architect, this is so the cinemagoer can feel like the star of the show. The same idea is repeated on the underside of the giant roof that covers the Encants Vells bric-a-brac market, where reflections 'express the relationship between the market and the city'. The mirrors have their charm, but the condescending pseudo-intellectual justifications don't. They could have saved the mental energy for more practical matters. If you want a roof to protect people from the elements, don't put it 24 metres in the air, without side walls, because both sunlight and rain will pour in when they fall at an angle. Just another of the challenges of doing architecture on these awkward planets - the kind with atmospheres, and that orbit stars.

UNSOUND PRINCIPLES

Architects and their clashes with natural phenomena are a constant in the city. Take Ricard Bofill, designer of the National Theatre of Catalonia. He dug out all his student notes on Greco-Roman pomposity, but forgot to revise the way sound travels, and other subtle laws of physics. The result was a stunning neoclassical coliseum – with a main auditorium that's too big, difficult to fill, and has a flat, dry acoustic quality that makes it almost impossible to hear the actors' lines. A minor oversight that has entailed years of building works and the need for onstage amplification.

SILLY NAMES

For a century and a half, Barcelona had a street dedicated to El Duc de la Victòria ('The Duke of Victory'), a tribute to General Espartero, whose great service to the city was to bombard it in 1842. Since 2007 it's been known simply as the Carrer del Duc, a change that doesn't really clear up the underlying issue. On the other hand, the name of Joan de Coloma – 'Secretari



Coloma' – who brought the Spanish Inquisition to Catalonia, survives unaltered in a street in Gràcia. He hasn't yet become a victim of the city's periodical toponymic rethinks, such as the wave of renaming that followed the transition to democracy, when many street names were Catalanised with a zeal that was often taken to extremes. The backstreet in Sarrià named after the city of Arrecife in the Canary Islands became Carrer de l'Escull – 'Reef Street' – a direct translation that entirely misses the point.

WAR ON THE PAVEMENTS

A pedestrian walks between two white lines in a trance, only to be rudely awoken by the hysterical bell of a cyclist, demanding that they abide by point 2 of article 14 of the city's traffic ordinance, and stop obstructing the bike lane, which takes up the whole of the middle of the pavement. Meanwhile, a cyclist finds that the dedicated bike lane suddenly stops dead, but they're not sure whether they should continue on the pavement, in case they're accused of infringing the second part of point 6. When work began on Barcelona's network of cycle paths in 1990, some planning genius decided not only to carve space out of the roads, but also from the pavements. Since then there's been all-out war between cyclists and pedestrians. Passing motorists can be seen snickering from behind the wheel.

THE TRIALS OF THE CAFÉ TERRACE

The cherry on the cake for Barcelona's crowded

'Pee before you leave the house,' said then-mayor **Joan Clos**, in reply to a citizen's complaint about the lack of public lavatories in Barcelona. 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to turn their backs on each other. Is a face-toface conversation an affront to civic decency?

COMPETITION-FREE SPORT

Barcelona's back-to-back design philosophy is starting to make waves outside the city too - perhaps not on an international level (yet), but it has reached the city's suburbs. In Sant Andreu de la Barca, for example, there's a park where you can play non-confrontational basketball and football, a version in which rival teams can never clash, because the baskets and the goalposts, instead of being at opposite ends of the pitch facing each other, are in the middle, facing opposite directions. It's a pointless design - you could never play a match - but it does represent a significant saving, as they only require one pole for the two baskets, and a single set of goalposts for the two-way net.

HIGH-RISK URBAN DESIGN

Similarly, on the three basketball courts at the Parc de la Solidaritat in Esplugues de Llobregat, there are baskets, but only at one end: at the other, there are none – perhaps to avoid the

tedium of the official regulations. But these courts are not just an exercise in futility: there's also the excitement of endangering life and limb, thanks to a sporting version of the thigh-busting steps that divide up Barcelona's hard-surfaced squares. The courts are arranged in a row, one next to the other, without barriers, as a series of steps down the slope. So if you try to stop the ball going out of play, there's the added risk of falling on top of a player on the court next door, or, if you really put your back into it, straight onto the tarmac of the ring road down below.

IGNORE YOUR INSTINCTS

Defecating on a street in Barcelona can be expensive, if you get caught: the fine will set you back around €250 on an ordinary thoroughfare, and between €750 and €1,500 if you obey the call of nature at the Sagrada Família or any other tourist monument, as established by the city's bylaws on civic conduct in 2005. Taking a leak and spitting don't come for free either. At the same time, the total fines paid by the 6,000-plus infractors who are charged every year don't even cover half the city council's budget for keeping the streets free of waste. It's the price you pay for having lots of civic-minded legislation but hardly any public toilets in a city whose streets host more than nine million bladders, between locals and tourists.

pavements are the bar and restaurant terraces, a Mediterranean institution subject to volatile regulations. Until 2013, the rules were different in each city district. Since last year, they've been regulated by a new, unified, citywide ordinance which, however, does not apply to particular avenues and squares, including the busiest tourist hotspots in the city centre. Meanwhile, bar owners in outlying neighbourhoods are driven to distraction as they try to comply with an exasperatingly exhaustive set of rules, including such bright ideas as a prohibition on permanent awnings with advertising, in a city in which terrace awnings have been financed by advertising for years. Wise bar owners now cover the trademarks with paint to avoid a fine.

CHAIRS FOR COUPLES IN CRISIS


The city's guidelines on street furniture establish a set of 20 requirements for seating in public places. They specify measurements, proportions and materials, but they don't mention placement and spacing – with some disconcerting results. It's perhaps understandable that there should only be single chairs, and not benches, in the city centre. The idea was to discourage rough sleepers – or perhaps tired and emotional tourists – from turning them into temporary beds. What's harder to understand is why these chaste seats are placed in pairs, but facing opposite directions, forcing anyone who occupies them

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From August 5 to 16, Barcelona is once more the destination of choice for many in the LGBT community-indeed, around 70,000 if past editions are anything to go by - who'll flock to the city for what has become a can't-miss summer date: Circuit Festival and Girlie Circuit. These events are renowned for their parties and highlights such as the Water Park Day, and cater for all tastes and interests. Here's our guide to the main things going on, as well as suggestions about how to meet people in the city.

WATER PARK DAY AND NIGHT

As is now the custom in August, men arriving from all points of the planet are invading Barcelona this month to enjoy Circuit, a fun-filled festival organised this year for the eighth time by the Matinée Group (responsible for, among other things, one of the most popular sessions at the epic Ibiza club. Amnesia). Out of the many parties that are held (18 this year!), the one that provokes the most excitement is the Water Park Day and Night (Tuesday 11, €90, 10am-6am at L'Illa Fantasia Water Park; Circuit buses run every five minutes from Plaça Catalunya); it's the most fun, most diverse and most intense party of the Circuit line-up. Arrive early to ensure you get a locker, and don't look too closely at the water, which by midafternoon will be filthy. There are a lot better views on offer.

KEEP YOUR SHIRT OFF

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Clearly if there's one thing that does well at Circuit, it's the pool parties. The first aquatic event this year is the Matinée Pool Party, held on Saturday 8 at the Complex Esportiu L'Hospitalet Nord in one of Barcelona's neighbouring city, L'Hospitalet del Llobregat (tickets cost €20 in advance and €25 on the door; 4pm-11pm). This is also the venue for the Papa Main Party and the Main Party the following Saturday, offering 14 hours of pool partying for €70 (you can get advance tickets for the separate events for €30 and €40, respectively), and The Beach Party on Sunday 9 (4pm-11pm, €25 in advance). If you're looking for a different kind of wet entertainment, don't miss a new edition of the Xtreme fetish and sex party featuring live sex shows and hosted by porn star David Ávila, on Tuesday 13 (venue tbc).

BOY SEEKS BOY

When Barcelona was living under the steel fist of the Franco dictatorship, finding a man who wanted to meet other men was dangerous and, above all, difficult – unless you headed to the dodgy turf of the Raval, you faced a real challenge. However, from the era of Ocaña and his protests in the late '70s and early '80s, the situation has effectively done a 180-degree turn, and today there's any number of places to head to meet like-minded souls.

For example, if it's stocky, hairy bears you're into, then the Bear Bacon Bar (Casanova, 64) is the place for you. If, on the other hand, you prefer a more sophisticated style, something fashion-forward, at La Penúltima (Riera Alta, 40) in the Raval, you'll find exclusive haircuts, electronic music and beards in all the sizes and shapes that you can imagine...

If you're not looking for words but rather sex without complications, **Open Mind** (Aragó, 118), **La Base** (Casanova, 201) and **Berlin Dark** (Passatge de la Prunera, 18) are your best bets.

For fans of the sea, fresh air and sun, the beaches of Mar Bella and Barceloneta are the ideal place to go on the prowl. Use the line about 'Could you keep an eye on my stuff while I'm swimming?' to get a conversation going with someone who interests you. On the other hand, if what you want are bodies in great shape dancing all night long and you're in the mood for getting down and dirty, don't miss the Saturday nights at Pervert (Ronda de Sant Pere, 24).

Finally, remember to keep your eyes open as you're walking around town. At any pedestrian crossing or corner, especially in the centre, if you pay attention to men you like, you'll soon see if they look back or just ignore you. Don't prejudge anybody. That guy who may not seem like it, could well be on the lookout for someone just like you. *-Martí Sales*

LEGENDARY LESBIAN TIME

The female version of Circuit has its own share of noteworthy action. The Legend Party, which brings the week-long festivities to a close on Sunday 16 is, appropriately, a legend in its own right. Spain's biggest lesbian event, which has run for 12 years, this year features seven hours of open-air pool action with a stellar line-up of guest and Matinée resident DJs, including Deborah de Luca and Mia Wallas. One of the big names at the 2015 Girlie Circuit is Patricia Yurena, who was voted Miss Spain in 2008 and Miss Spain Universe in 2013, coming second in the Miss Universe contest of the same year. She'll be a special guest at La Leche on Friday 14 (Under Club. 11pm-6am, €20 on the door including one drink), the party where her girlfriend Vanesa Klein is the headlining DJ. Also on the programme are the **Lezzgo! Opening** party and concerts (Wednesday 12, 10pm-6am, Sala Bikini, €20 including one drink) and Girlicious Party with DJs and a live performance from Valencian musician Lara Taylor (Thursday 13, Bloc Club, 11pm-6am, €20 including one drink).

IT'S NOT ALL PARTY, PARTY

The mega-festival isn't just made up of parties - there's also a range of sporting and cultural events going on. Throughout the 12 days you can, for example, enjoy art shows such as 'Project Gender 5 -Intersex' (Forsale Gallery, Còdols, 11), exploring identities that reject standard social, religious and other stereotypes. Historian Leopold Estapé will lead a talk about the experience of members of the LGBT community down the ages (Wednesday 12, 5pm, Axel Hotel). Events aimed at women include a self-defence workshop (Sant Sebastià beach, Thu 13, 6.45pm) and an open mic poetry and storytelling session (La Sue, Sun 16, 8pm). The extensive lineup also includes Sing-Along versions of The Rocky Horror Picture Show (Fri 7, 10pm, Aribau Multicines) and Hairspray (Sat 8, 10pm, Aribau Multicines). Sporty types can enjoy various sessions including yoga, spinning, paddle surf and volleyball. And if you fancy it, speed dating and a shopping tour are also on offer.

The neighbourhoods of Gràcia and Sant Gervasi are no longer the sole zones for lesbians in this city, as they were some years back. The Gaixample had its golden age, but recently rainbow-coloured flags have joined with the banner of diversity in the Raval, and there are now a variety of venues in that area where you can meet girls who like girls. Dine at La Monroe (Plaça de Salvador Seguí, 1), Manolito (Robador, 18) and the classic restaurant Las Fernández (Carretes, 11). Ideal for a drink are La Penúltima (Riera Alta, 40), Madame Jasmine (Rambla del Raval, 22) and La Casa de la Pradera (Carretes, 57), where you can also go dancing if you can find space. Make sure your gaydar's on form to be able to distinguish between the various sexual preferences around.

One of the big trends in BCN at the moment are regular party nights, which take place every fortnight or so, or once a month...and may continually change venue. If you're into an alternative, modern scene, then you should seek out Les Fatales, SomosLas and Muerta Sánchez wherever these DJs play you're bound to meet girls like you. They're normally to be found at Apolo (Nou de la Rambla, 113) and smaller venues around the Raval. The Sunday vermouth parties from VenTú! are also good to try (ventubcn.es). On the other hand, if you're more a fan of pop hits or classic sounds, then try Stupenda at Aire (Diputació, 233), Girlicious from the Matinée Group, Silk BCN and Melon Party, or Las Vecinas del Cuarto. – Cristina Carbonell

Bags with memory

Approaching product design from a radical point of view. The big challenge for Mexican architect Mónica Juvera is called Loope. By **Laia Beltran**

'Can I design a handbag that's made from a single piece of material, including the strap, and that closes completely?' This is the challenge that Mexican architect Mónica Juvera set herself two years ago. Used to working on large-scale projects, she was keen to try product design. Handbags proved to be ideal for the task.

She did her research and discovered that the majority of bags available on the market were designed using three or four base templates. Juvera wasn't interested in trying to improve what others were already doing, nor did she think that she had a particular talent for combining colours and materials. What really motivated her was approaching the concept from a new angle. That's how she's been able to meet her own challenge and create bags using just one piece of material, strap included, and that can be completely closed with its zips. And while these are the key features of Loope products, they aren't the only ones.

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From Tuscany to Andalusia

Using her sewing machine, Juvera created two prototypes. From that



starting point, she then had to face two new tests: finding the material and arranging the production process. She found vegetabletanned leather (free of chrome) in Italy, specifically in Tuscany. It's top-quality caramel- and chocolatecoloured leather, soft to the touch and doesn't hide the imperfections of the animal it came from. The bags – with impeccable finishings – are sewn by expert hands in a small workshop in the Andalusian town of Ubrique.

The sum of these variables converge in each of Loope's bag, which are a lesson in radical geometry, and also in memory, thanks to a noble leather that captures the inexorable passing of time and the experiences of the holder. Juvera loves to use her own bag as an example. For more than a year she's carried it with her everywhere and she's seen how it's changed in colour and texture. And she likes the metamorphosis. 'We have to move away from the premise that we're only beautiful when we're 25. I think we have to look for other values, such as the beauty you find as time passes.'

You inspire us

Loewe has rediscovered the brooches of Ramon Puig Cuyàs. By **Eugènia Sendra**

For almost 40 years, Ramon Puig Cuyàs has taught jewellery making at Barcelona art school Escola Massana, and he's full of praise for this trade that led him to art. He argues that contemporary jewellery communicates with, reflects on, and wants to understand the universe - just like literature and photography - and it creates alliances between the piece and its wearer. Puig loves this intimacy, and he achieves it through micro-sculptures that re-create the symbolic value of ancient ornaments. 'I'm interested in making them look like pieces from an archaeological museum, and having them connect with the transcendent.' His brooches have no genre, a fact that appealed to the cool hunters of Spanish fashion label Loewe and its creative director Jonathan Anderson, who was impressed by Puig's work from the '80s. Now, as well as having a presence in international museums such as London's Victoria & Albert, the ieweller's works also form part of Loewe's art collection, and have inspired some of the motifs in the winter 2015-16 collection of the luxury firm.

They launched a publishing house and record label last autumn, then at the end of June this year they presented a new project focused on design items. 'The idea's been around for a while,' says Cerveró, 'and as with our publishing arm, which takes little-known local writers and releases their books, we want to do the same with textile and industrial designs.'

The scheme, baptised Labrador, has begun with towels designed by illustrator Mirena Ossorno, who heads up projects like the feminist fanzine *Bulbasaur*. SKY BAR AT GRAND HOTEL CENTRAL

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Many of Barcelona's rooftops offer a rather restricted view of the city's major sights. The terrace at the top of the Grand Hotel Central will not let you down: with its seemingly endless pool and impressive views of almost the whole city, it's no surprise that the Sky Bar doesn't stay empty for long. The limited public access (from 8.30pm) only adds to its popularity. This year they've started taking reservations, and it's worth booking as prices here are relatively cheap... in rooftop terms. 
THE PULITZER TERRACE AT HOTEL PULITZER

Only a stone's throw from Plaça Catalunya, this urban garden is the perfect place to kick back and relax on a temperature-friendly night. Sip a sweet cocktail while enjoying the tropical paradise around you, as well as evening live music and DJ sessions from Wednesday to Friday. The view from this terrace may not be as outstanding as that from some of the other places listed, but it certainly makes up for that with its Spanish and Catalan culinary delights and the sense of being in a green oasis in the city's heart. **Bergara, 8.**

CLARIS

LA TERRAZA DEL CLARIS AT HOTEL CLARIS

On the cusp between elegance and cosiness, La Terraza del Claris is an ideal choice for a great time. The view from the large rooftop is pretty good, but the true strength of this spot is its atmosphere of luxury and stylish design. What's more, unlike many other rooftop bars, La Terraza del Claris also boasts a top restaurant. While there are certainly cheaper places to dine out, well-prepared local specialities and friendly staff ensure you get what you pay for. **Pau Claris, 150**.



B-POOL BAR AT B-HOTEL

Not only does the spacious rooftop terrace provide a good view of Plaça Espanya, but dining next to the too-blue-to-be-true pool under the envious gazes from the Arenas shopping centre's viewing platform just opposite has a certain draw. Compared to other rooftop bars, the prices for yummy tapas and cool drinks are relatively affordable here, so you can fully enjoy your evening on this elegant terrace with a clear conscience. **Gran Via de les Corts Catalanes, 389-391.**

LA TERRASSA AT VILLA EMILIA

If what you're after is a hidden jewel, a place not yet over-explored by heaps of visitors, Villa Emilia's La Terrassa could be the perfect place for you. Just a short walk from Plaça Espanya, this cosy, tastefully furnished rooftop terrace is an excellent example of Barcelona's Mediterranean and laid-back side. It enjoys an intimate atmosphere, and prides itself on its live music sessions and popular Thursday and Saturday barbecue nights (pre-booking for these events is essential). On other days, they offer a small but fine selection of tapas, along with refreshing cocktails. **Calabria, 115.**

LA DOLCE VITAE AT HOTEL MAJESTIC

The Majestic is a place of elegance, first-class service and exclusivity. Unsurprisingly, its rooftop terrace sticks to the script with amazing views of the Sagrada Família and Montjuïc, and an extensive culinary offer supervised by Michelin-starred chef Nandu Jubany. At €10 for a glass of their least expensive wine, it's not exactly a bargain, so if you're watching your budget you should probably consider La Dolce Vitae as an option for a special occasion rather than a hazy Tuesday afternoon. Half a century of tributes

Barça's season opener, this year celebrating 50 years, pays homage to the club's founder



Hans Gamper may not be a household name nowadays in the mould of Messi, Neymar or Sánchez, but his role in the history of FC Barcelona is fundamental. A footballer in his native Switzerland, Gamper founded the Football Club Barcelona in 1899, and would become its president five times, keeping it afloat and often thriving. He brought in new members, strengthened its finances, was the driving force behind the creation of the club's first grounds, and recruited its first professional coach in 1917. He was much-loved in this city, where he was known by the Catalan name of Joan. Sadly, in the 1920s, Gamper found his world permanently shaken. He was banned from Spain by the dictator Primo de Rivera, allegedly due to his support for Catalanism, and his business interests were decimated in the economic crash. Although he was eventually allowed to return to Barcelona, he wasn't permitted to involve himself with Barça, and a depression that engulfed him as a result of these blows eventually

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saw him take his own life in July 1930 – he was 52.

Since 1966, the club has paid tribute to him with the annual Joan Gamper Trophy. This friendly competition originally took a fourgame format (two semis, thirdplace play-off and final). In those days, before social media and jampacked match schedules, it was an unmissable pre-season event for fans keen to see both their familiar heroes and the club's new signings after the summer break. For the past 20 years, it's been a singlematch contest but is still a great chance to experience a Camp Nou match, and see the team's stunningly skilled players in action. Competing for the trophy this year are AS Roma, and they face no easy task - in the past four Joan Gampers, Barça have scored 19 goals, but let in only one. Hans would have been proud. – Hannah Pennell



Don't stop the music

The Mas i Mas Festival is a multi-date, multi-venue, multi-genre affair. **Clemmy Manzo** talks to its artistic director, Pere Pons

Barcelona and music festivals go together like rhythm and blues. How is the Mas i Mas Festival different to the others? It focuses purely on music rather than the social aspect that makes up a large part of the other festivals. Plus it's over a month long, with more than 300 performances across the city, ranging from jazz, soul, funk and blues to flamenco, electronic and classical.

How has the festival changed over the years?


When we started 13 years ago, the city was culturally – and literally – deserted in August. Since then, the Mas i Mas Festival, which is always held in August, has become one of the year's cultural highlights, attracting visitors and showcasing the best national and international musical offerings.

Who are this year's absolute must-sees?

Dave Holland and Kenny Barron (Monday 3 and Tuesday 4), Maria del Mar Bonet (Saturday 1 and Sunday 2), and any of the electronic sessions at Moog. Special mention also goes to pianist Marco Mezquida (Tuesday 4), and Kayah and the Barcelona Gipsy Klezmer Orchestra (Monday 24).

And why was Rocío Márquez chosen to close out the festival?

Her album *El Niño* (2014) is a colossal work of modern flamenco. She respects tradition, paying homage to classic musicians like Pepe Marchena, yet at the same time she's pioneering. Accompanying her on the guitar is the patriarch of flamenco, Pepe Habichuela. There'll also be collaborations

with guitarist Raul Rodriguez, singer El Niño de Elche, and indiepop musician Raül Fernández (aka Refree). It's without a doubt the flamenco event of the year.

Tell us about the venues

All six venues are emblematic. Moog occupies the space that was once the Café-Theatre Villa Rosa, where Barcelona's first flamenco performances were held in the late 19th century (C/ de l'Arc del Teatre, 3). Jamboree is Spain's temple of jazz, now celebrating its 55th year. It has hosted some of the world's greatest jazz musicians, among them Chet Baker, Dexter Gordon, Ornette Coleman, Brad Mehldau, Elvin Jones, Lee Konitz and Kenny Garrett (Pl. Reial, 17). Los Tarantos was founded in 1963 as one of the first flamenco tablaos in Barcelona (also Pl. Reial, 17). Palau de la Música Catalana is a beautiful example of Catalan modernisme, which has been declared a UNESCO World Heritage site (Palau de la Música, 4-6). El Born Cultural Centre, the site of the old Born Market, preserves ruins from the 1714 bombings [during the Siege of Barcelona] (Pl. Comercial, 12). Finally, new to the festival this year is the Reial Cercle Artístic. part of Gothic Barcelona and now converted into a cultural space (Arcs, 5).

So would you say the festival pays homage to Barcelona?

More than that, it's a declaration of love to the music and musicians who make Mas i Mas possible.

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Tàpies. An artist's collection

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Fundació Antoni Tàpies Until January 10, 2016

Sometimes I love reading the small print. For example, there's a letter in this exhibition that records how Antoni Tàpies exchanged nine of his own works for five by other artists, which were the property of US gallery owner Martha Jackson, I look at the measurements and characteristics of the pieces by Tapies, and the measurements and names of the artists his work was exchanged for: Pollock, Kline, Motherwell, de Kooning and Sam Francis. The proportion is approximately two to one, both in number of works and size.

This small detail highlights the worth of the young Antoni Tàpies at the height of the New York informalism movement, when that city was the capital of the art world. It also reveals that he wasn't very taken with Dalí. The latter had introduced Tàpies to Jackson and promoted him through articles in the city's specialised art press. Tàpies, in contrast, had a copy of the Christmas 1934 issue of the monthly Catalan cultural magazine D'Ací i d'Allà and he tried to get works from all the artists featured in that showcase of modernity-Miró, Kandinsky, Picasso - all of them, except Dalí.

Changes in standards

This show displays 31 works acquired or exchanged by Tapies, and 43 works by Tapies himself, painted between 1947 and the mid-1980s, all taken from the most recent donation his family made to the Foundation. Accompanying the art on the walls is a previously unreleased film by Maria Lluïsa Borràs, made in 1981. Having watched it, I wonder why the documentary hasn't been shown before. Take a look, you might find the answer...

Overall, what can we learn from this show? A) Tàpies was an intelligent. sensitive and ambitious man (which is all good); B) Tàpies encountered a kind of linguistic-creative disorientation once he made the jump to informalism: his work between 1962 and 1980 is too theatrical; and C) the best Tàpies starts from 1981 with his varnish paintings, and the simplification of his semiotic language - he moves from theatrical magic to interior scenography.

But none of this would have been possible without the enormous confidence of the artist in his work, capable of proposing exchanges with the big names, and writing his own version of art history, whatever anybody else might think. Let time be his judge. - *Ricard Mas*

Summer nights on the town

During the summer in Barcelona, there's no shortage of outdoor events to make the most of the (slightly) cooler evenings. What can make many of these activities even more enticing is the fact that they're held in buildings with splendid al fresco spaces, particularly when it comes to Gaudí's unique creations. In Passeig de Gràcia, La Pedrera has a varied programme this month, from weekly flamenco shows in one of the building's beautiful interior rooms to regular evening jazz concerts on its

rooftop. And if you want to see La Pedrera in a new light (literally), take the audiovisual tour 'Gaudi's Pedrera. The Origins', which includes a spectacular videomapping on the roof.

At Casa Batlló, a little further down the same street, you'll find special events taking place on its fabulously named Dragon's Rooftop. From Wednesday to Saturday, their 'Magic Nights' feature live music, drinks and food tastings, which you can combine with a tour of the building itself. If you prefer to get away from the



centre of town, overlooking the city in the foothills of Collserola is Torre Bellesguard, which, from Wednesday to Saturday, hosts 'Gaudí Nights' –these include guided tours, food and concerts.

Palau Güell is the most exclusive venue, opening its roof terrace for just three concerts this month, featuring musicians from around the world. –Hannah Pennell







Catalan cuisine, made in London

British-Catalan co-production La Bellvitja takes a fresh look at local traditions, with the occasional medieval flourish and oodles of inventiveness and skill. By **Ricard Martín**



In Barcelona's old city, deep in the Raval, a backlog of gastronomic bad karma waits to be purged. A greasy cluster of tourist traps cling on, displaying croquettes in two textures: burnt or frozen.

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So it's a delicious irony that an English company has opened La Bellvitja, a highly recommendable restaurant specialising in Catalan cuisine, just along from the equally attractive Placa de Sant Agustí. Of course there's a Catalan connection: co-owner Monika Linton also runs Brindisa.a pioneering London-based firm that imports Catalan and Spanish products to the UK. After studying in London, Linton lived in Vic, a town in central Catalonia, for three years. 'The first products we brought to the UK were Catalan: fuet and llonganissa sausages from Vic, Garrotxa cheese, and codonyat

(quince jelly),' she remembers. Almost 30 years later, Brindisa runs five Catalan and Spanish restaurants in London.

Celebrating local produce

Now they've closed the circle with La Bellvitja. 'It allows us to cook in the place where we started, in direct contact with the raw ingredients of Catalan cooking,' Linton says. The restaurant, 'a celebration of local produce from land and sea', is in a former chapel to the Virgin of Bellvitja, which stood empty for 10 years. The restoration of the interior, evoking Protestant austerity rather than Catholic opulence, is superb.

Any British influence on the menu has been deliberately avoided. You could call it a Catalan co-production that happens to have its head office in London: the kitchen is run by Josep Carbonell, executive chef; Carles Ramon, head chef; and Oriol Lagé, souschef and one of the team behind Ot, a restaurant that blazed a trail for creative cooking in Barcelona. La Bellvitja's menu is short and thoughtfully constructed: it connects directly with local produce and traditions, and even includes medieval touches - roast potatoes with almadroc sauce and botifarra negre (black sausage); a sort of allioli with cheese recorded in the 1324 Llibre de Sent Soví. The platillos respect the traditional meaning of the term in Catalan cookery: little culinary diversions, braised or stewed, with an emphasis on sofritos (fried tomato, onion and garlic), poultry and offal, served in earthenware dishes to be scooped up with a fork or spoon. The salt cod belly with chickpeas

and sobrassada spicy sausage is a perfect example. Then there are creative dishes that come across as vegan trompe l'oeil: roasted veg tartare with an 'egg' made of sweet potato. 'It wouldn't make sense just to serve the standard croquettes and ham,' argues Linton, 'and it would be extremely difficult to do what we've done without Catalan chefs.'

Solid Catalan cooking with creative touches, a nod to late master chef Santi Santimaría's food philosophy, and dishes like beetroot-tinted rabbit rillettes with foie gras and pickles. Fantastic flavours in a chapel where the mortification of the flesh is no longer on the agenda.

My friend and I start our evening by heading down a winding staircase. Next we descend into the very bowels of Casa Camper, when, out of nowhere, a rectangular, wood-covered haven filled with retro armchairs appears right before our eyes. It feels like a clandestine cocktail bar from '50s Hollywood. Humphrey Bogart's cologne lingers in the air. Loudspeakers sporadically infuse the venue with jazz. And two pool tables in perfect condition rule the roost: the cues are hanging on the wall; the balls are perfectly lined up on the green cloth. It's the kind of place that could only have dreamt of appearing in The Color of Money.

Color of Money. Lithographs and paintings line one wall of this 21st-century speakeasy, pulling customers' eyes towards the bar. Well, more specifically, to the hypnotic afro hairstyle of Archie, the superb bartender who tends to ignore the drinks menu, instead preferring to talk to his clients to identify their poison. He brings me a Bloody Mary with wasabi, and I suffer an attack of alcoholic priapism: delicious.

Shaken and stirred

But it doesn't stop there. Archie performs his magic once more and pulls a 'strawberry cocoa' out of his hat. This potion, created with vodka and a pinch of chocolate, may sound offputting at first but the guy always gets it right. In point of fact, for my companion he prepares an invigorating concoction with passion fruit. They say it's a guaranteed aphrodisaic. That's what they say... –Óscar Broc



Even more Arola

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Catalan chef Sergi Arola is flying high at the moment. On the one hand, at the Arola restaurant in the Hotel Arts, the summer season is well underway with cocktail and live music nights every Thursday until the end of this month, the funk and soul group Sugar Drops perform from 10pm. The combination of Arola's creative tapas (starting with his famous patatas bravas) and cocktails on what is one of the best terraces on the Barcelona seafront make for a luxurious evening out. On the other, the cook is expanding his presence in the

Catalan capital by becoming a consultant at the Basque restaurant Ura (the impact of his wisdom is such that it is now known as Ura by Sergi Arola). The restaurant hasn't lost its Basque essence, but rather is widening its menu based on a vision of new trends as perceived by Arola. He aims to enhance the seasonal nature of the dishes, which this summer is focusing on raw foods, particularly ceviches and tartars.

Senyor Vermut

I'd been thinking of going out for tapas for days, and since I'd visited Senyor Vermut at the beginning of February, I decided to go back and record in black and white what had been a fascinating experience.

It's a neighbourhood place, in the left-hand part of the Eixample to be precise, a fact that's far from irrelevant. As Raimon, the great Valencian protest singer of the '60s, said, 'lose your origins and you lose your identity'. Run by the Miralles family, Senyor Vermut practises the noble art of the aperitif. Those of us of a certain age remember our grandparents preparing the Sunday vermouth with essentials such as Martini Rosso, soda siphon, tinned clams and Laughing Cow cheese.

On the afternoon I returned to Senvor Vermut, the tipple of the day was Negroni, and I set things rolling with this classic cocktail, one part gin, one part red vermouth, and one Campari. They say a Negroni awakens the appetite, and so it did. The Senyor Vermut menu of tapas and small plates isn't all that different from what you'd find at many a more magnificent establishment, but at the Miralles family bar everything has the Miralles touch. There was a peach gazpacho, all kinds of croquettes the wild mushroom ones are fantastic - a traditional capipota

(calf's head and foot stew) with the same rich flavours as the ones my grandma used to make, interesting if not superlative patatas bravas, and a *broqueta moruno* – skewered pork kebab – marinated in oil and spices. Bearing in mind a certain scene in *Monty Python's The Meaning of Life*, I decide not to risk an explosion and round things off with a lemon sorbet.

Before I leave, I'm already compiling a wish list for visit No. 3: the *bomba de la Barceloneta* (a giant breaded fried grenade of mashed potato and meat, on a splodge of *allioli* and spicy sauce), the Cantabrian anchovies, the *bunyols* (salt cod fritters), the meatballs with cuttlefish, the Murcian potato chips and the tapa of Payoyo cheese. I'll come by bike next time to burn off the calories. *–Daniel Vázquez Sallés*

Into the fire



Ingredients x 2 = Torres

At Dos Cielos, the ingredient is the philosophy, but the philosophy doesn't upstage the ingredients. By **Pau Arenós**

Talking about ingredients in cooking is like talking about concrete in architecture. It's impossible to do anything without them, but to take this basic element and deify it is to distort reality.

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All cooking is based on ingredients, although not all ingredients make for good cooking. The Torres brothers, Sergio and Javier, have made firstclass raw materials their métier. What does that mean? That they do their utmost to find suppliers who are perfectionists, and to seek out products at the source. 'We've become more specialised in ingredients,' they say, and that 'more' makes all the difference: as well as being consumers, they're researchers. They tell me that their TV show Cocina2 came about as a consequence of this, and not vice versa, as did their cookery book De la tierra al cielo

(From Earth to Heaven). Like good architects, they work on groundbreaking projects. Of all the meals I've eaten at Dos Cielos, and I've had a few, this was the best.

Why? Because of the maturity and the restraint of their ideas, and because Brazil and its influence have gradually waned (they no longer have restaurants

The restaurant terrace – dining among skyscrapers.

Recommended if: You want to experience one of Barcelona's top restaurants.

Stay away if: Haute cuisine gives you vertigo. there). The academic approach, to which they owe a debt via Alain Ducasse and Philipe Rochat, has also been relaxed. What are they trying to achieve? 'Tastes, technique and beauty.' Fun, ideas, outstanding ingredients, the occasional dish with a narrative, a barely contained sense of irreverence. El Cáliz, for example: underneath a communion wafer sits black Las Pedroñeras garlic to ward off evil. Vampires beware.

Or their Comecocos (a cheeky reference to the video game known globally as Pac-Man) – fresh cheese with almonds, semicured at the restaurant. 'We go out with our head chef, Albert Pujols, and the other cooks to have a picnic on Collserola, and we pick almonds.' Why aren't there more chefs exploring the Collserola range above the city, in search of herbs, plants, fruit, surprises, inspiration? Barcelona's cuisine looks out to sea (and not enough), with its back to the mountains,

The sommelier Koldo Rubio has created some serious wine pairings, although I find that the constant coming and going of so many liquids bothers me more and more. Of the 12 servings, I toast the Conxita Serra de Solergibert, the caipirinha and the 2012 Ferrer Bobet.

There were dishes with plenty of muscle: aubergines from Sant Climent de Llobregat pretending to be a baked potatoes (with a slip of silver representing tinfoil), the tomato stuffed with dried poor cod (and the pickles frozen into a circle of ice - an instant summer hit), the Tudela asparagus with ham sauce, the huge Huelva prawns with Galician seaweed, the chargrilled Extremaduran suckling kid. The dish that least impressed me was the beans, which reminded me of Quique Dacosta's lima beans back in 2013. Among the desserts, the one with strawberries, home-made kefir and fresh wasabi grated at the table was pure green luxury.

On the 24th storey of the Hotel Meliá Barcelona Sky things are happening. This isn't elevator cuisine, it's music with a powerful hook. The ingredient is the philosophy, but the philosophy doesn't upstage the ingredients. What's the formula? Produce x 2 = Torres.





One delicious recommendation: grilled sardines in sauce, though they don't always have them. Rice dishes are a staple on the menu, and never disappoint. *Plaça Prim, 1.*

Ibiza comes to Barcelona

The DGTL Festival lands in Barcelona. This Dutch original features two nights of excellent house and techno over a single August weekend. By Javier Blánquez

Nowadays Barcelona residents are used to hearing about their city's 'brands' expanding across the world - with Primavera Sound and Sónar leading the charge. But locals are so used to this situation that they've almost missed the fact that Barcelona has become a paradise for international promoters, attracted by the conviction that the Catalan capital is capable of hosting festivals that last for hours. This relationship started with the week of madness that is Sónar, where everybody was renting out venues to celebrate their own mini festival, and now it's become one of the summer's key events. While one result of Barcelona's global appeal is companies such as Live Nation contracting DJs for massive parties on the beach, this month there's a new, authentic player at the hottest

clubbing table in town, and its name is DGTL. On August 14 and 15, at the Parc del Fòrum, the city welcomes this electronic music festival with an unbeatable line-up that is focused on refined techno and elegant house.

For two years, DGTL has been an essential date on the electronic music calendar in Amsterdam, a city that's full of this kind of initiative. It's always taken place during Easter week, a short holiday that's ideal for a two-night festivalseason warm-up, and now that DGTL is looking to expand abroad (see, it's happening in the

Netherlands, too), they've had Barcelona in their sights as a priority. What they do is not much different from what happens in local clubs every weekend - or half an hour away by plane, in Ibiza - but DGTL's appeal lies in the way it will concentrate a serious number of top DJs during peak tourism season and one of the hottest months of the year, while keeping its eye firmly on the most demanding clubbers.

You just have to look at the programme: it's like Sónar Off-Week, or the best afters programme in Ibiza, or the house tents in the now-defunct Monegros festival, but all amassed in the heart of the Fòrum. The first-day acts include Agoria, Âme, Ben Klock, Boddika, Maceo Plex and Henrik Schwarz, who triumped at this year's Sónar with his evening house set. The second day's protagonists are artists such as Adam Beyer, Breach, David August, Dixon and Marcel Dettmann - in other words, regulars from clubs including Berghain, Fabric and Barcelona's own Nitsa, leaders in deep house, refined techno and lightly cosmic electro. What's more, local DJs are given a fair crack of the whip: on the line-up you'll find John Talabot, DJ Fra, Kosmos and Pau Roca.

This promises to be a quality event: a well-designed line-up with dependable artists who never tread on, let alone cross, any red line, perfect for losing yourself in the music at a carefree festival made for summer's short nights. DGTL means it'll be a bit less boring in Barcelona this August.

1. Festa Major!

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August is when some of the biggest towns in the Barcelona region celebrate the holiday season and their patron saints with their Festa Major-celebrations that include processions, dances, fireworks and human towers, as well as concerts, fairs and more. Vilanova i la Geltrú (until Aug 6), Igualada (until Aug 25), Sitges (Aug 20-25), Manresa (Aug 23–Sep 1), and Vilafranca del Penedès (Aug 29-Sep 2) are all in a festive mood. Taradell celebrates the festival of Toca-Sons (Aug 24-25), which begins with the announcement that legendary



bandit Toca-Sons has taken over the town. And in Granollers (Aug 22-30), the city splits into two groups whose good-natured rivalry in tug of war contests, water fights and more is the centrepiece of the festival. barcelonaesmoltmes.cat/ en/web/agenda

2. Firamar at Sant Pol de Mar The tradition of singing *havaneres* comes from the trade that linked Catalonia with Cuba in the 18th century. Throughout the summer, these sweetly nostalgic popular songs are performed in open-air concerts up and down the coast. With its narrow streets and whitewashed houses, Sant Pol is the epitome of a Med fishing town, and Firamar celebrates this maritime heritage with workshops, a craft fair and a havaneres festival. And no evening of havaneres would be complete without *ron cremat* – a spicy cocktail of flambéed rum. *End* of *August. www.santpol.cat*

3. Sheepdog Trials

The International Sheepdog Trials at Castellar de n'Hug, high in the Pyrenees, have been held since 1962. Shepherds from France, Andorra, the Basque Country, Aragon and the Balearic Islands compete in trials that test dogs' herding skills and the special connection between shepherds and their canines. The event also celebrates the lifestyle of mountain shepherds, with participants wearing traditional garb from their areas. Aug 30. www.elbergueda.cat

4. Terrazel

The night of August 10, Sant Llorenç d'Hortons is the stage for a battle between nature and humankind's capacity for devastation. The giant figure of Mother Earth is joined by elves, a dragon spewing smoke and pollution, the forces of good, and a magical unicorn, come to defend Earth. The spectacle fills the streets with fireworks, music and dancing. www.terrazel.cat

Walk this way

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Sweet-scented pine forests to one side, clear blue sea to the other: Catalonia's coastal paths are ideal for summer walks. By **Nick Chapman**

SMUGGLERS & PATROL PATHS Catalonia's coastline has rugged cliffs.mountains.wetlands. sweeping bays and sandy beaches - and practically its whole length can be walked on over 583 km of coastal footpaths. With sections to suit all, from seaside strolls to rocky scrambles, these paths let you discover quiet coves and rarely visited beaches, with the chance of a refreshing dip never far away. The idea of a camí de ronda - literally a 'patrol path' - comes from the Costa Brava. In the 19th century, ancient paths made by farmers, fishermen and sailors were used by the Carabineros, a force set up to control smuggling. In the '40s and '50s, the Guardia Civil patrolled the coast in a largely unsuccessful attempt to stop boats landing black-market goods - mainly cigarettes, but also penicillin, chocolate and silk lingerie.





THE MEDITERRANEAN TRAIL As Spain left post-war shortages behind, the camins de ronda lost their stated purpose, and many fell into disuse. But Catalonia has a long-established tradition of hiking, (*excursionisme*), and local associations worked to maintain and restore the paths. The individual sections were gradually

linked together and signposted to create a single long-distance route, christened the GR-92 to commemorate '92 Olympics in Barcelona. The GR-92 now continues beyond the borders of Catalonia, through Valencia and Murcia and into Andalusia, where it is under construction as far as the Straits of Gibraltar. The GR-92 is the southern stretch of an even larger pan-European footpath, the E-10, which links the Baltic Sea to the Mediterranean.

WALKING THE COSTA BRAVA The most popular stretch of the GR-92 follows the Costa Brava: serious walkers do the whole thing, from Cotlliure to Blanes, in 12 days, but many of its sections make ideal day walks. One of the most picturesque heads north from Palamós, past the whitewashed beach houses at Cala S'Alguer and the sandy beach of Cala Castell, before winding up red cliffs with views of rocky coves, and then down to the tiny beaches of Cala Estreta and Can Pomes. From here you can make your way back to Palamós, but the surefooted may want to continue the route along this wild section of coast, passing the remote coves of El Crit, Font Morisca and El Vedell, before skirting the botanical gardens at Mont Roig and rejoining civilisation at Calella de Palafrugell. Other popular sections link Aiguablava with Begur, Almadrava with Cala Montjoi, and S'Agaró with Sant Feliu de Guixols. At www.camideronda.com you can book organised or self-guided tours of the area, lasting from two to eight days. For independent travellers, the Sarfa bus company (www.sarfa.com) offers links from Barcelona to many of the starts and finishes of the walks.

MARESME & COSTA DAURADA Closer to Barcelona, many camins de ronda can be reached by public transport - one is the route that links Sant Pol de Mar with Calella, making its way along narrow town streets and train tracks, and through tall reed beds to the beaches south of Calella. Further south, in the province of Tarragona, the Costa . Daurada offers plenty of attractive possibilities. You can follow the coast from L'Ampolla to the unspoilt beach of Cala de l'Aliga in L'Ametlla de Mar, or stroll the seafront on the camí de ronda at Salou.

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La Valenciana

Located on Aribau, just below Gran Via, this city classic has been tempting locals, especially students from the nearby University of Barcelona, since 1910. It's been run by a Jijona family for four generations, and, as is the norm with such places, in winter switches its focus to torrons (nougat-like bars eaten around Christmastime).

2. Ice Barcelona

In this Vila Olímpica ice bar, the chairs, floor, walls, tables and even the glasses are made of ice. They kindly lend customers a coat at the entrance and, once inside, you can't stop dancing, at least if you don't want your feet to freeze!

3. Creación 57

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Famous ice cream made by La Menorquina, with sponge cake bathed in liqueur, and vanilla, coffee and cinammon ice cream. all covered in chocolate. The fun comes from the fact that when vou bite into it vou never know which flavour you'll find in your mouth. Unfortunately, it's not actually available in Barcelona to try it, you have to head to the Balearic Islands. What a shame!

4. La Cremaria Toscana

This is the place for authentic Italian gelati artigianali, with branches at Muntaner, 161 and Princesa, 26. It's an initiative of Milan native Andrea Giuntoli, who goes back to his Tuscan roots to make extremely creamy ice cream.

5. **Stick House**

In C/ de la Bogueria, just off La Rambla, is this ice lolly (aka popsicle) shop. It's hell on earth for ditherers because there's seemingly endless flavours to

choose from, and they all look delicious. What's more, you can pimp your polo (as they're called round here) by having it dipped in white chocolate, or topped with almonds or coconut sprinkles. Mmmmm!

6. Ice cream shops on La Rambla

Not so long ago, there were stalls selling a variety of birds as pets on Barcelona's most famous street. The concept of animal rights intervened and



they were converted into places to buy Barcelona souvenirs and ice creams. But there seems to be a curse on these city centre vendors, and the question is once again being asked, what to do with these stalls?

7. Kakigori

This is a Japanese ice cream made of snow, the antithesis of the obscenely rich products some of us are used to. Last summer. Australian Martin Kunz. who lived for a decade in Japan, opened a place called Kakigori in Verdi, 49 (Gràcia), where you can try these refreshing and (bonus!) much less fattening ices.

8. **Organic ice cream**

This is the latest novelty in many local ice cream shops. They use milk sourced from happy cows and fruit that hasn't been touched by chemical fertilisers, and vegans are also catered for. So it's impossible to confuse these worthy creators with those sinners who sell additive-packed Iollies that kids love so much.



Yoghurt

Frozen yoghurt is also trending in Barcelona. Next to Plaça Francesc Macià, Danone has a place where you decorate your icy yoghurt with a variety of toppings. There's fruit, but lots of other treats as well because where's the fun in being too healthy?

10. La Sibèria

One of the last ice factories in Poblenou, La Sibèria was founded in 1910 and closed in the 1970s. With the area's recent development, it should have been converted into something cool, like a space for up-and-coming designers. But the economic crisis means such plans have had to be put on ice.


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
